# Working out the rankings

Read on to see what we use to calculate the top UK language centres. Our yearly rankings are based on all British Council inspection reports as of 19 September 2025.

ritish Council inspections cover up to 15 areas. In our rankings, each area is shown at the top of the table. For each area, inspectors award one of three judgments:

- It is an area of strength (marked '1')
- It has a need for improvement (marked '-1')
- It meets the standard (marked with a blank space)

# Changes to the 2024 ranking

Following the introduction of new inspection standards for Academic Staff Profiles in 2024, inspectors are now asked to decide whether the qualifications and experience of the teaching team are 'appropriate', 'largely appropriate', or 'clearly appropriate' - a much more subjective measurement.

If our rankings gave equal weight to the new and old criteria for teacher quality, it could negatively affect the ranking of centres inspected before 2024. To avoid this, we looked for another variable that is closely correlated to teacher quality: teaching quality (as measured by classroom observation). Educational research suggests that observed teaching is likely to be better where teachers are fully qualified graduates.

We found a positive correlation between teacher qualifications and teaching quality across all sectors. While the British Council criteria for teacher quality have changed, the criteria for teaching quality have not. Therefore, centres that are strong in both Academic Staff Profiles and Observed Teaching are more likely to be of consistent quality, regardless of the educational context.

To reduce the variation between the two systems, we created an algorithm to adjust the ranking score in 2024 and have done so again this year. This provides a slight uplift for centres that are strong in both teaching and Academic Staff Profile. These centres are marked with a '†' in our rankings.

# What's new for 2025?

You will notice there is no longer an asterisk for Compliance Reports. In previous years, we did not include strengths or weaknesses assigned to a school during a compliance or spot check. This meant that a school could be penalised for a weakness from a full report that they had since corrected, but the correction would be ignored if it was noted in a follow-up compliance report.

To provide the most accurate and up-to-date rankings, we have now changed our policy. This year, we are using all available

information to keep the rankings current, including all types of reports.

## How we calculate the score

To calculate each centre's ranking score, we use the information from the most recent full report, and, new for this year, any subsequent compliance or spot check reports.

We take the following steps:

- 1. Take the total number of 'areas of strength' awarded on the last full report.
- 2. Deduct the number of 'needs for improvement' from the full report.
- Add back in any areas needing improvement from the full report that have since been noted as corrected in a compliance report.
- Deduct any new 'needs for improvement' noted on a compliance or spot check inspection.
- 5. Add four to the result to account for the full range of scores accepted for accreditation, which includes 0-3.
- 6. Divide the sum by the number of areas inspected, which is typically 15.
- 7. Report the score as a number out of 10.

Our rankings are based on inspection results in 15 areas for centres that teach under 18s, and 14 areas for those that do not. The names

of all 15 areas are listed at the top of the rankings table. In the column under each area, scores for each school are marked in a box: '1' for a strength, '-1' for a need for improvement. Where the box is empty, the centre met the requirements. The scores are normally based on the 'summary statements' but we use full reports when these are missing.

The scores are calculated as percentages of the perfect score but are published as marks out of 10. The seven centres at the top of the table all score 100%, shown as a 10. A centre scoring 9.5 on our table has 95 per cent of all available points. This year, all centres are in the same percentile ranking—for example, the top 8%—even though there might be a 0.7-point difference between the top centre in that percentile and the bottom.

We can show what we consider the top 25%, but because of how our rankings are calculated, we cannot include exactly the top 25% as many schools have the exact same score. New for this year is the full list of all schools and their associated scores which will be published soon on the EL Gazette website. The top 100 schools all qualify as an EL Gazette Centre of Excellence.

You can also see that we have included regional sorting, in accordance with Office for National Statistics (ONS) standards on regions.

# Analysis: What do the 2025 rankings tell us?

Top-tier schools and trends.

he latest UK language centre rankings from EL Gazette reveal a dynamic landscape, with a mix of stability at the top, significant improvements for some schools, and the emergence of new players. A direct comparison of the 2024-25 and 2025-26 lists highlights key trends and changes that agents and prospective students should note.

While many schools saw their scores fluctuate, a select group of institutions maintained their perfect 10.00 score across both years, solidifying their positions as the UK's leading language centres. These consistently high performers include:

- ELC Bristol
- $\bullet\,$  The English Language Centre, Chester
- The English Language Centre, Brighton
- LSI/International House Portsmouth
- The London School of English
- Summer Boarding Courses
- Wimbledon School of English

This stability at the pinnacle of the rankings suggests that these schools have consistently met the highest standards across

a range of criteria, from teaching quality to student care.

# Rising stars and new arrivals

The 2025-26 rankings feature several schools that either improved their standing or made their debut on the list, demonstrating the competitive nature of the sector.

- NILE Norwich made a notable leap, improving its score from 8.50 in 2024-25 to 9.5 in 2025-26.
- International House Torquay also saw a significant boost, climbing from a score of 8.00 in 2024-25 to 9.0 in the new rankings.

The 2025-26 top 25% welcomes several new entrants, including:

Harrow School Short Courses with a strong score of 9.5

# University of Dundee with 8.4

These new additions indicate that the landscape of quality language education is expanding beyond traditional institutions.

# Changes and departures

Not all schools maintained their positions. Some notable institutions from the 2024-25 list are absent from the top 25% in the 2025-26 rankings. These include:

- King's Foundation, King's College London
- St. Giles International, Brighton
- Bishopstrow College, Warminster (now closed)

The latest *EL Gazette* rankings offer a comprehensive overview of the UK's language centre landscape. While the top tier remains a bastion of consistent quality, the shifts and new entrants further down the list reveal a dynamic and evolving industry.

# The rise of university language centres

A notable trend is the strong performance of university language centres. While they had a presence in the 2024-25 list, a greater number of them have entered or maintained a position in the top 25% in 2025-26. The 2024-25 list included University of Manchester, University of Sheffield, and Plymouth Marjon University. The 2025-26 list sees a wider range of universities, with new and strong entrants like the University of Dundee and others, indicating a growing strength in this sector.

# Regional performance

With the new ONS regional sorting, a trend is visible in the concentration of top schools. The South West (SW) and South East (SE) regions of England, as well as London (LDN), appear to have a higher concentration of the highest-scoring schools.

### The impact of new scoring criteria

The "†" symbol, which denotes a "slight uplift for centres which are strong in both teaching and Academic Staff Profile", is strongly correlated with top performance. All seven of the schools with a perfect score of 10 in the 2025-26 rankings have this symbol. This suggests that the new methodology is effectively highlighting schools that excel in these specific areas.

# What have we learned?

The 2025-26 rankings provide a compelling look into the evolving UK language centre landscape, with a clear connection between the updated scoring methodology and the rise of specific sectors and regions.

significant trend in this year's rankings is the increasing presence and strong performance of university language centres. Building on the success of institutions like the University of Manchester and the University of Sheffield in the 2024-25 list, the 2025-26 rankings see a wider range of universities entering or maintaining a top 25% position. This growing strength is underscored by new entrants such as the University of Dundee.

This strong performance is particularly notable when viewed through the lens of the new scoring criteria. The "†" symbol, introduced to give a slight uplift to centres with strong teaching and Academic Staff Profile scores, is strongly correlated with top performance. All seven schools that achieved a perfect score of 10 in this year's rankings have this symbol. The fact that many of the highest-ranking university language centres also have this symbol suggests that their excellence in these critical areas is a key factor in their success. This indicates that the new methodology is effectively identifying and rewarding schools that excel in teaching and staff quality, a trend that appears to particularly benefit the university sector.

The rankings also reveal a clear geographic trend. While top-performing schools are found across the UK, there is a distinct concentration of the highest-scoring centres in the South of England. Three of the seven schools with a perfect score of 10 are located



in the South East (SE) or South West (SW) regions, including:

- ELC Bristol (SW)
- The English Language Centre, Brighton (SE)
- LSI/International House Portsmouth

This highlights the continued strength of these regions, which are also home to some of the country's most established language centres. The remaining perfect-score schools are located in London (LDN), the North West (NW), and are multi-centre (MLT).

## The job market's influence

This regional dominance may be influenced by the local job market for teachers. London and the South East offer a high density of teaching jobs and, in London's case, the highest average salaries for teachers in the UK. While a nationwide shortage of qualified language teachers persists, the economic and professional opportunities in these regions may help attract and retain the highly qualified academic staff that are a core component of the new ranking criteria. This suggests that the prevalence of top-tier schools in the South is not a coincidence but may be linked to the ability of these regions to attract and maintain a strong talent pool.
